

ELSIE AWARDED O.A.M.

CONGRATULATIONS to U3A Nunawading's Course Administrator Elsie Mutton, who was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia in this year's Australia Day Honours for her outstanding contribution to lifelong learning.

The Australian honours system recognises the actions and achievements of people who go above and beyond what could reasonably expected, and in doing so encourages national aspirations and ideals of the highest community standards and values.

Elsie's honour acknowledges her many years of volunteering which started in her teens and continue to the present day. Over the years Elsie has volunteered for a wide range of community and church activities and for the past 18 years most of her efforts have been to grow the U3A movement.

Nothing seems impossible for Elsie when it comes to enhancing the lives of those moving to the next stage post full-time work and her vision and leadership have inspired many others to step up and take on leadership roles themselves, volunteer their time in administration or share their skills to lead a class.

The Order of Australia Medal is the latest in a string of awards acknowledging Elsie's contribution to the community. They include City of Whitehorse Citizen of the Year, National Volunteer Award, Victorian Premier's Volunteer Champions Award, Victorian State Senior of the Year – Council of the Ageing Award, Victorian Premier's Volunteer Award Finalist and in 2015 Elsie was a Ministerial Appointment to the Victorian Advisory Committee for Volunteers.

Elsie has held leadership positions within the U3A movement at all levels. She was President of U3A Nunawading from 2000–2004, President of U3A Asia Pacific from 2012–2013 and President of U3A Network Victoria from 2012 – present, a position she will step down from at the AGM in March.

During her time as President of U3A Network Victoria,



Elsie's efforts have included negotiations with Local and State Government which resulted in formal support which has enabled the significant growth of the Victorian U3A movement in both suburban and regional areas. Elsie was also prominent in the formation of the U3A Alliance of Australia to promote the organisation at the National level. Likewise her participation as President of the U3A Asia Pacific reflected her level of commitment to the ideals and enthusiasm she has for the cause she holds dear.

During her various state roles Elsie has overseen an expansion to 109 U3As in Victoria and a 30% increase to 35 000 individual members.

As U3A Nunawading Course Coordinator, Elsie is responsible for the administration of approximately 240 courses and over 180 class leaders.

The commitment, energy and passion Elsie demonstrates daily in her pursuits is extraordinary and her very well deserved OAM is an acknowledgement of both her personal achievements and the value she continues to deliver to U3A and the wider community.

The majority of members enrolled online and I am sure you all found it very easy to find your way around the membership system. Don't forget when you enrol online, after you tick your selection you must confirm the selection otherwise it will not place you into the class of your choice.

If you have enrolled in a class and have not received an acknowledgement of your request, please look in your SPAM or JUNK mail. If there is no message please advise the Course Admin office coursec@u3anunawading.org.au and it will be followed up.

On a waitlist for a class? Don't panic, if a place becomes available you will be notified. Do not turn up to a class unless you have been accepted into it. It is embarrassing for the Leader to have to ask you to leave.

If you miss three classes without an apology you may be deleted from the class, making room for those on a waitlist.

Reminders

Name Badges: You must wear your name badge at all times at U3A Nunawading. If you do not have a name badge please ask at the Silver Grove office and ensure you complete the details on the back.

Change of enrolment or contact details: You can do this online by using your membership number and password. Once logged in, go to edit my details; make changes and save. If you wish to withdraw from a class, fill in an orange form available at the office or email coursec@u3anunawading.org.au You cannot delete yourself from a class.

Contact details: The email address you have given us is our main contact for you. Please check your email messages regularly and your spam or junk mail. If you change your email address please change it in your Member Details or let us know.

Car Parking: There are 2 and 4 hour restrictions on car parking. Be careful if you park in the Meals on Wheels area. There is 4 hour parking in this permit area only after 1pm and only in the row nearest the main car park office. If you overstay and are fined, U3A can do nothing to help you.

Paulina's energy recognised

POPULAR U3A Nunawading Class Leader and member of the Committee of Management Paulina Chong received a Whitehorse Community Award on Australia Day. Council's annual awards honour the outstanding efforts of people who work, live or volunteer in the municipality of Whitehorse.

Paulina's contribution to her community is extensive, particularly the time and commitment she gives to U3A where she leads two classes each week, Zumba and Empowerment, and is a highly valued member of our Committee of Management.

Paulina felt so sorry for the huge number of members on the huge waiting list for her Zumba class, she went out and found another trained Zumba class leader. Because of her entrepreneurship, U3A Nunawading is able to accommodate over 100 participants in Zumba classes each week. This is typical of Paulina's 'can do' attitude.

Paulina's organisational abilities and infectious enthusiasm enable her to create highly successful events. In 2015 she coordinated U3A Nunawading's 25th Anniversary activities and in that same year staged a flash mob dance performance at Box Hill Plaza to draw awareness to Elder Abuse. The looks on the faces of the passers-by were priceless.

Other events Paulina has organised include a three-day event called Games, Music and Movement as U3A Nunawading's local contribution to Seniors Week, initiated a hugely popular talk on Mindfulness by a Monash University professor and arranged performances by groups of U3A class members at Federation Square and Whitehorse Spring Festivals.

Paulina has been a member of the School Councils of Mitcham and Parkmore Primary Schools, working in canteens and school libraries and on fundraising committees. She also instructs Chair Zumba for aged care

residents in Blackburn, a way of engaging with the elderly and providing them with a fun activity.

The audience at the Australia Day Awards Ceremony at the Whitehorse Centre were moved by Paulina's mission to aspire to inspire. Following directly after the Citizenship Ceremony, Paulina spoke of her own journey. She arrived from Malaysia in 1989 and became an Australian Citizen in 2003, joining U3A in 2009.

Paulina is a perfect example of someone who has come to this country from overseas and is making a wonderful contribution to her community and we congratulate her on this very well-deserved award.

Another U3A Nunawading member who received a Community Award was Cecily Falkingham who has devoted her time to environmental sustainability and protection over many years.

DETAILED plans for the new Community Hub and our future home are being finalised. The new facility will incorporate a refurbished heritage school building, multi-functional classrooms and meeting rooms and specially-fitted out spaces for dance, art, counselling and lapidary. The complex will incorporate a purpose-built Meals-on-Wheels facility, communal kitchen and multi-purpose sports stadium.

The Hub will be integrated with Tunstall Park with landscaping, enhancement of open green spaces, new pedestrian and cycling paths and areas for relaxing and playing.

First Fleet Royalty



IAN Stuart joined the Beginner's Class for Genealogy early in 2017. He originally wanted to know how to trace and make contact with two half-siblings from his father's first marriage. We found these half-siblings and where they lived but alas no contact was made as they didn't reply to Ian's letters, so that trail ended there.

Being naturally curious and Ian's family tree originating in Sydney, New South Wales, I conducted research on my own, knowing that early New South Wales settlers descended from many of our convicts transported to Australia. I thought there would be some consolation for Ian not being able to contact his half-siblings to maybe finding a convict in his family tree.

One line of his tree led to a John Randall who was a member of the First Fleet. John was sentenced to seven years transportation on 14 April 1785 at Manchester Quarter Sessions for stealing a silver watch chain, the property of Joseph Wardle. Sent to the Ceres Hulk early in 1786, aged 21, he was delivered to the transport *Alexander* on 6 January 1787. John Randall, a 6 foot tall, well-made black American Negro labourer, born about 1764 in New Haven, Connecticut, North America, arrived in Australia with the First Fleet on 26 January 1788. How he arrived in the North of England is unsure, but he may have made his way there after the end of the American Revolutionary War in 1783.

I suggested to Ian that he should have his DNA done through AncestryDNA, to see if he had a high percentage of African in the results. Sure enough, when the results came back Ian had 7% African as part of his pie chart, confirming African heritage.

Ian applied to the "Fellowship of the First Fleeters" in Sydney, New South Wales, was accepted and has been presented with his Certificate of Authenticity and Badge. Congratulations Ian.

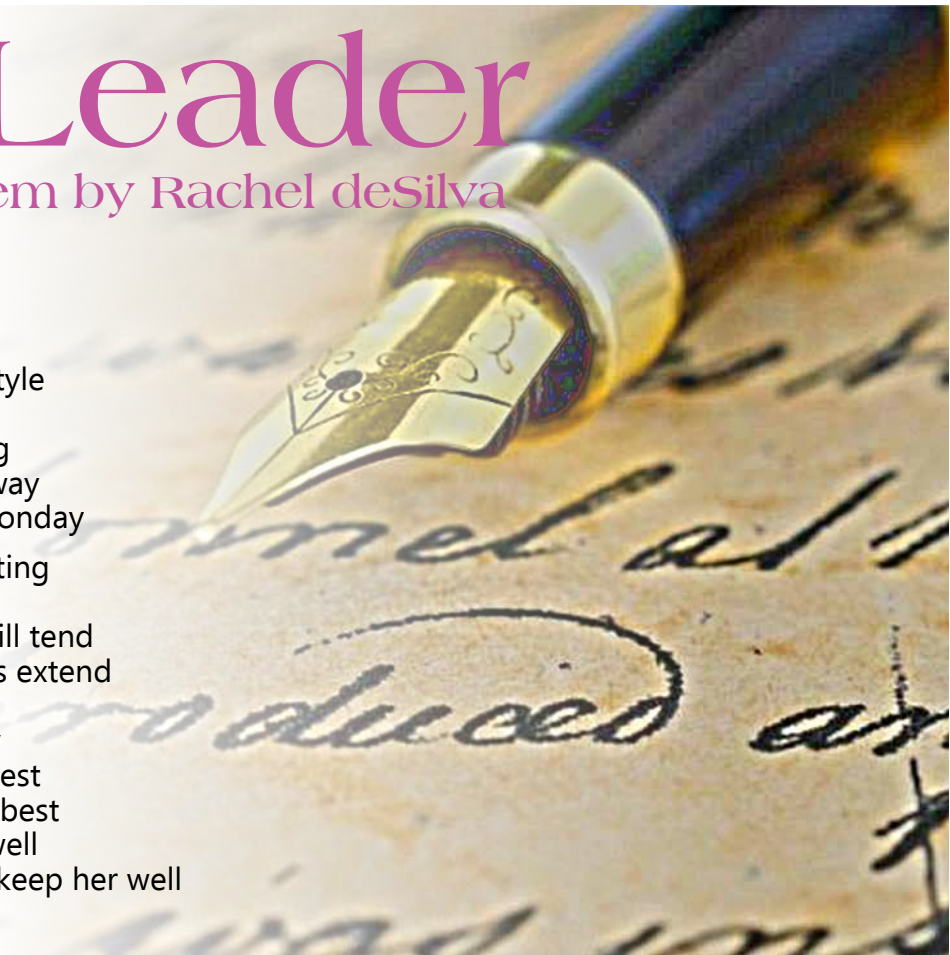

quality, affordable solar systems for pensioners

WHITEHORSE City Council is participating in a program called Solar Savers to help pensioners to install solar panels with no upfront costs. As many are put off by upfront costs and complexity of finding a quality system and installer, Council has joined with 24 other Victorian councils to offer the Solar Savers program.

SS supports pensioners install solar panels, save money on electricity bills and lower greenhouse gas emissions. It is offered only to

pensioner households, because most own their own homes and use the majority of their power during the day when solar panels are producing electricity. SS checks that solar panels are right for your household and that it will save you money. Then, helps you to arrange a quality solar system from a trusted installer.

There are no upfront costs. You pay for your system gradually through a low-interest bank loan which costs less than the savings you make on electricity bills. To save even more apply for Council's \$154 solar panel rebate.

The SS program is open to Whitehorse residents who own their home; have a Government Pension Card (aged or disability); are usually home 9am- 5pm; have average to high electricity use; do not currently have solar panels.

In 2017 Jim left Australia to visit his family in England. While he was there, Jim became ill with a virus and was brought back to Melbourne and was in hospital here for some weeks before he died.
